While this is blatant in the financial world, it is also true in the Christian world, as opposed to those who follow the Lord Jesus Christ. We are all flawed and then some. But the follower of Christ is called to mature, as in grow closer to completeness or perfection (look it up). In the process of making our mistakes, we need to claim them, repent of them, reconcile them, and then continue since we will find the same again in similar or new areas.

Consider those who turn to the state rather than engage in dialog with a brother. Obviously we see in 1^{st} Corinthians 6 that this is a shameful thing, and in 2^{nd} Timothy 4 that we are to unceasingly engage each other. Yet, I see that I remain imperfect, but strive to mature (see above).
